The tradition of the St. Joseph Table *la tavola di San Giuseppe* has its origin in Sicily. Legends from the Middle Ages attributed the end of a devastating drought to a prayer devotion that the Sicilian people made to St. Joseph. Please bring your bread to the front door of our Parish Center before Mass and someone will assist you. After Mass, all are invited to come and celebrate Good St. Joseph's patronage and intercession on the 3rd Floor in the Aula Magna room. VEILING OF IMAGES DURING PASSIONTIDE—The

centuries-old tradition of veiling the sacred images in the Church from Passion Sunday until Easter (or Good Friday in the case of the crucifix) is rooted in the last words of this Sunday's Gospel "But Jesus hid himself and left the temple" (John 8:59). As Christ's divinity is veiled during his passion, so we cover the images of the saints as the liturgical observance of his suffering and death draws near, "because it would seem improper for the servants to appear when the Master himself is hidden" (late 13th century Bishop William Durandus of Mende in Southern France). The 19th century monk Dom Prosper Guaranger also references the closing of today's Gospel in his comment that "this veiling expresses the humiliation to which our Savior subjected Himself, of hiding Himself when the Jews threatened to stone Him."

BLESSING OF PALMS—Next Sunday palms will be blessed before the procession at the beginning of the 11am Solemn High Mass. The blessing which the Church gives us for the palms on this day begs the Lord to increase our faith and to pour out his mercy upon us. Drawing an allegory from the fruitfulness of Noah and Moses, who went forth from the ark and from Egypt, respectively, Holy Mother Church asks of God that we may go forth to meet Christ with good works. Thus the palms are for us an encouraging reminder both of our work to live a true life of virtue and of the promised reward of persevering faithfulness to the Lord. Whether by the palm of red or white martyrdom, we must never cease striving to live so as to one day hear from the lips of Our Lord: "Well done good and faithful servant... Enter into your master's joy." The petition that we may enter into the everlasting joy of heaven is the ending note of the blessing of the palms and is the very reason of our lenten observances and indeed of our entire earthly pilgrimage. Thus, everyone is encouraged to attend the procession this coming Sunday at 11am – even those who are assisting at one of the low Masses that day. You can join in the procession without having to stay for the High Mass, provided you assist at another Mass on Sunday. Please know that the blessed palms will be available in the Church narthex until Good Friday.

Notes on Today's Music

Processional hymn: *How Hast Thou Offended*, 836 Recessional hymn: *O Sacred Head Surrounded*, 837

Kyriale: Mass XVII, 762; Credo VI, 788

Hymn after Offertory: *Stabat Mater*, Chant Sequence Communion Motet: *Eripe Me, Deus*, Orlandus Lassus

The Mass of Seven Sorrows of the Blessed Virgin Mary may be said on the Friday of Passion Week. During the Mass the sequence *Stabat Mater* is sung prior to the Gospel. This sequence is often used as a devotional hymn for praying the Stations of the Cross and is sung to a simple tune. The chant sung today is the proper chant, which is more ornate and the melody changes every two verses.

Eripe Me, Deus is a three voice Motet set by **Orlandus Lassus** and setting of the Offertory antiphon for the Monday of Holy Week. The translation is, "Deliver me Lord from my enemies O Lord I have fled to Thee, teach me to do Thy will for Thou art my God." Psalm 142:9–10

Orlandus Lassus (c.1532–1594) is known for the mature polyphonic style in the Franco-Flemish school. He wrote over 2,000 works in Latin, French, Italian, and German both sacred and secular. Lassus along with Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina and Tomás Luis de Victoria are the most influential composers of the late Renaissance.
