ANNOUNCEMENTS

BLESSING OF PALMS—Today, palms will be blessed before the procession at the beginning of the 11am Solemn High Mass. The blessing which the Church gives us for the palms on this day begs the Lord to increase our faith and to pour out his mercy upon us. Drawing an allegory from the fruitfulness of Noah and Moses, who went forth from the ark and from Egypt, respectively, Holy Mother Church asks of God that we may go forth to meet Christ with good works. Thus the palms are for us an encouraging reminder both of our work to live a true life of virtue and of the promised reward of persevering faithfulness to the Lord. Whether by the palm of red or white martyrdom, we must never cease striving to live so as to one day hear from the lips of Our Lord: "Well done good and faithful servant... Enter into your master's joy." The petition that we may enter into the everlasting joy of heaven is the ending note of the blessing of the palms and is the very reason of our lenten observances and indeed of our entire earthly pilgrimage. Thus, everyone is encouraged to attend the procession this coming Sunday at 11am – even those who are assisting at one of the low Masses that day. You can join in the procession without having to stay for the High Mass, provided you assist at another Mass on Sunday. Please know that the blessed palms will be available in the Church narthex until Good Friday.

EASTER BREAK FOR CCD CLASSES—There will be no CCD class on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. CCC Classes will resume on April 7th.

EASTER BREAK FOR ADULT CATECHISM—There will be no Sunday Adult Catechism Class on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. Classes will resume on April 7th.

EASTER BREAK FOR FRIDAY PROGRAM—There will be no Friday Program on Good Friday and April 5. The program will resume on April 12th.

EASTER HOME BLESSING APRIL 1-APRIL 6—Similar to the Epiphany home blessings earlier this year, the priests will be blessing homes during the Octave of Easter. This blessing will be offered to the first 10 people who request it and who did not receive the Epiphany home blessing this year. PAPAL BLESSING—A plenary indulgence is granted to the faithful who devoutly receive a blessing imparted by the Supreme Pontiff Rome and the World (*Urbi et Orbi*), even if, because of reasonable circumstances, they are unable to be present physically at the sacred rite, provided that they follow it devoutly as it is broadcast live by television or radio, under the usual conditions. (Manual of Indulgences, n.4) Pope Francis will impart this blessing on Easter Sunday, March 31st at 12pm Rome time (7am EST).

GOOD FRIDAY TRADITIONS: ADORATION OF THE CROSS & ABSTAINING FROM THE EUCHARIST—"The ceremony of the Adoration of the True Cross was first instituted at Jerusalem" as early as the 4th century and "was brought to Rome towards the end of the seventh century by an Eastern Pope, Sergius I" (Schuster). This rite was "carried out by the clergy after having first removed their shoes, which recalls the

ancient rule by which the Pope and the Cardinals on this day

walked barefooted in the stational procession" (Ibid.)

The 1962 missal directs all the ministers to remove their shoes if convenient before adoring the cross, and also states that first men and then women may process to, genuflect before, and devoutly kiss the feet of the crufcifix. This respect and adoration paid to the cross refers to Christ Himself, as Saint Thomas explains. (Summa, IIIa pars, q. 25, a.4)

On Good Friday, "as a sign of mourning, the offering of the eucharistic sacrifice is omitted. Instead we offer to God the merit of the bloody sacrifice of Calvary, with which we associate ourselves through humiliation and contrition of heart." (Schuster) In fact, a long-standing tradition was for Holy Communion not to be received on Good Friday. By the 12th century the liturgical custom dating from the early middle ages of abstaining from Holy Communion had been restored, and this practice continued well into the 20th century.

After the adoration of the Cross, the part of the Good Friday liturgy traditionally called The Mass of the Presanctified was the second part of Holy Thursday. The Eucharist consecrated the night before is brought from the Altar of Repose and consumed by the priest, completing his sacrifice from the night before and thus ritually linking the Last Supper and Christ's crucifixion as one sacrifice.

The absence of a communion service leaves the Church with a total absence of Christ - the reality of how much was sacrificed on our behalf. "So vividly is the Church impressed with the remembrance of the great sacrifice offered today on Calvary, that she refrains from renewing on her altars the immolation of the divine Victim" (Gueranger).

VEILING OF IMAGES DURING PASSIONTIDE—The centuries-old tradition of veiling the sacred images in the Church from Passion Sunday until Easter (or Good Friday in the case of the crucifix) is rooted in the last words of this Sunday's Gospel "But Jesus hid himself and left the temple" (John 8:59).

As Christ's divinity is veiled during his passion, so we cover the images of the saints as the liturgical observance of his suffering and death draws near, "because it would seem improper for the servants to appear when the Master himself is hidden" (late 13th century Bishop William Durandus of Mende in Southern France).

The 19th century monk Dom Prosper Guaranger also references the closing of today's Gospel in his comment that "this veiling expresses the humiliation to which our Savior subjected Himself, of hiding Himself when the Jews threatened to stone Him."

Notes on Today's Music

Recessional hymn: O Sacred Head Surrounded, 837

Kyriale: Mass XVII, 762; Credo VI, 788

Hymn after Offertory: *Vexilla Regis*, Chant Communion Antiphon: *Pater, Si*, Orlandus Lassus

During Passiontide and on September 14, the hymn *Vexilla Regis* is sung during Vespers. This hymn was written by Venantius Fortunatus (530-609) who wrote it in honor of the arrival of a large relic of the True Cross which had been sent to Queen Radegunda by the Emperor Justin II and his Empress Sophia.

Pater, Si, set to music by **Heinrich Isaac**, derives the melodic material directly from the Gregorian antiphon. In the musical tradition of singing the Passion narratives, as we hear at Mass today, Jesus has the lowest voice. In this motet, which takes the text from Our Lord in the Garden of Gethsemane, the voices are all set lower than an average Communio by Isaac—perhaps as a connection to this tradition.

Heinrich Isaac (c.1450–1517) was a Renaissance composer from the South Netherlandish region. His output was rivaled only by Orlandus Lassus in number and variety of composition. Most notable of his collections is *Choralis Constantinus* which contains nearly 400 Gregorian chant based motets of propers for the Mass.
